SPORTS

The sports activities this term have been a great success for Elk Point High. The football season led to victory as Elk Point trounced Mallaig 101-0, and easily defeated Cold Lake 42-1. After a very active season in basketball, both the boys' and girls' teams finished in the third playoff position with identical records of 4 wins and 4 losses. Both teams showed good form in the total point semi-finals against Glen Avon, but were eliminated. The Grade Nine boys also enjoyed an active season in basketball, but could only manage one win in 6 games. The hockey team's highlight this season took place at St. Paul where the County Tournament was held. Elk Point outscored Ashmont 12-1 in the semi-finals and easily outskated Racette in the finals to win the County Cup by a 10-1 margin. In curling, 21 teams participated in a very successful High School Bonspiel. The team representing Elk Point in the District Playdown in the Taylor, Pearson and Carson competition consisted of Dave Zarowny, Anton Kossey, Mark Croft, and Dan Zarowny. This team was the only one able to defeat the Cold Lake entry which later won the right to represent the zone, but despite this victory, Elk Point f nished with a 2 and 2 record. As the baseball and softball season have not begun yet, we can only hope that the boys will win the trophy, and that the girls will retain the one which they already hold. 
A new feature of the Home & School Ass. was Parents' Night. Teachers remained in their classrooms to receive visiting parents both after school and before the regular meeting.



When we leave Elk Point High and sadly separate from companions known for many years, we will experience the tug at heartstrings which will conclude our happy and carefree high school days.
