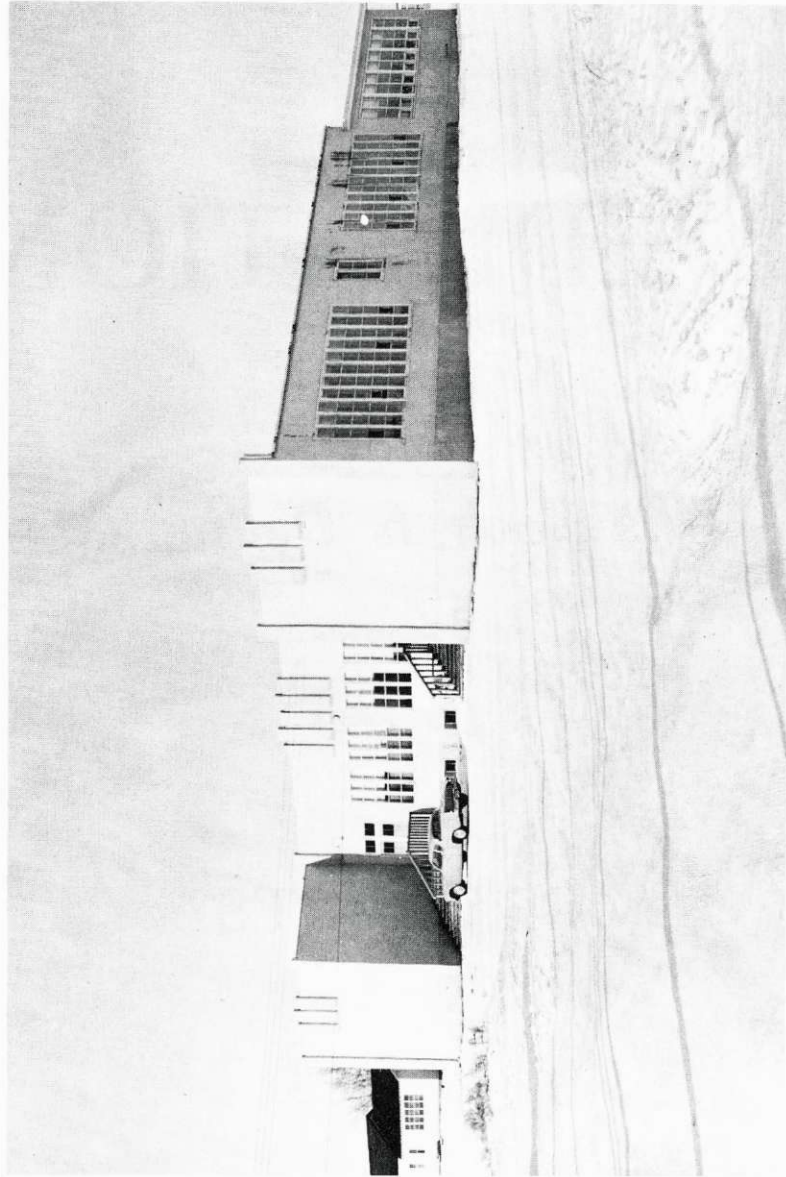

Education is the key that opens the door to jobs. The National Employment Service reports that it is extremely difficult to place students with less than a grade 10 education while secondary school graduates are quickly placed in jobs.

The amount of education a person acquires when he is still young affects his whole working life. The more schooling you have, the better your chances for finding a good job, and the more easily you can learn new things and improve your skills. The more schooling you have, the more occupations are open to you and the wider will be your choice of jobs. The more schooling you have, the more you will be able to contribute to the development and welfare of your country.

For successful achievement in high school a pupil requires academic talent to a degree, but this alone is not enough. He must be prepared to work hard to achieve a satisfactory standard in the various school subjects. Self-discipline is also necessary to enable him to study diligently in spite of the many distractions and temptations that lead young people to want to leave school. Not the least important factor for success at school is regular attendance.

Worthy students in need of financial assistance may now obtain a grant of from \$50 to \$200 under The Students Assistance Act, 1959, to enable them to continue their high school education.

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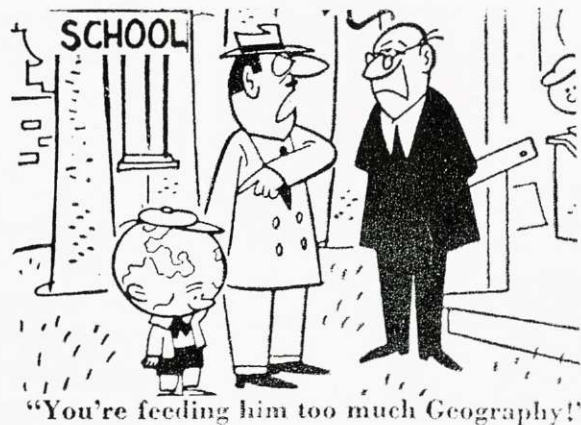

President's Message - Jeannette Wyness

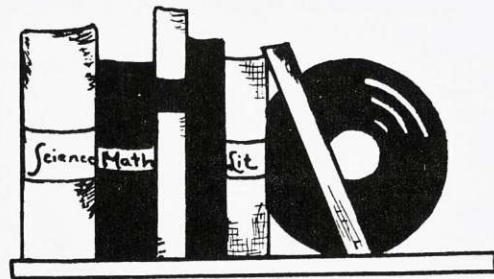

MR. BEATTIE

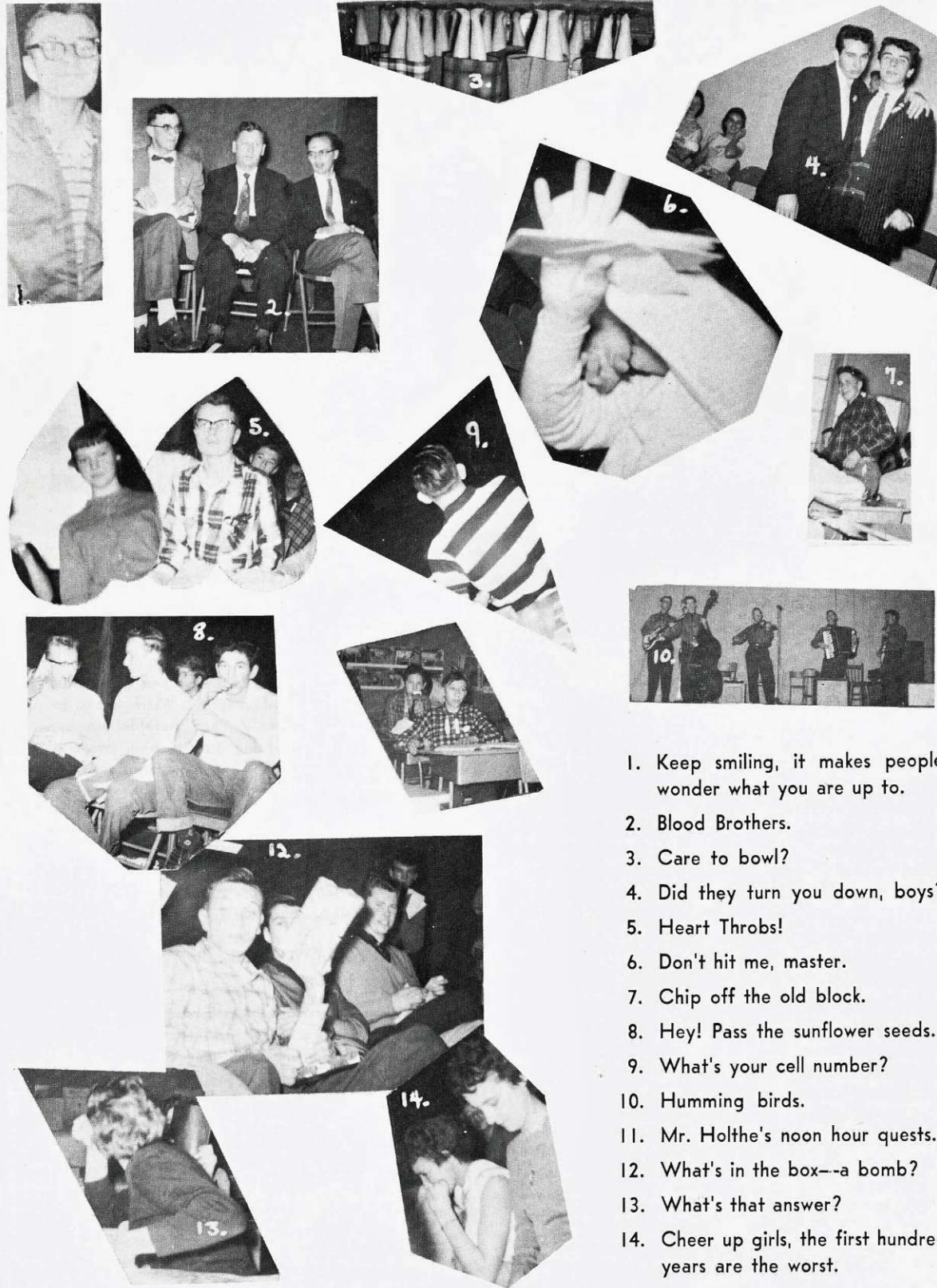

A WEEK IN BANFF (1958-59)

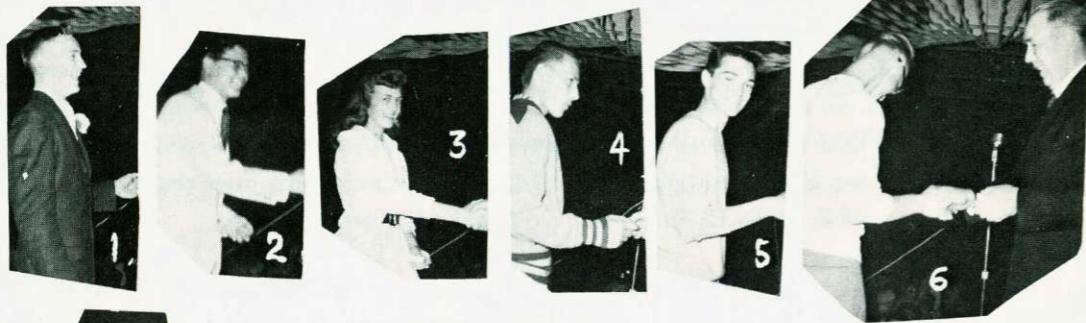
