The installation of the newly elected Students' Union executive of the Elk Point High School took place October 7th in the gymnasium.


Principal R.E. Beattie called the officers to the platform in turn, congratulating them and outlining their duties for the following term of office.

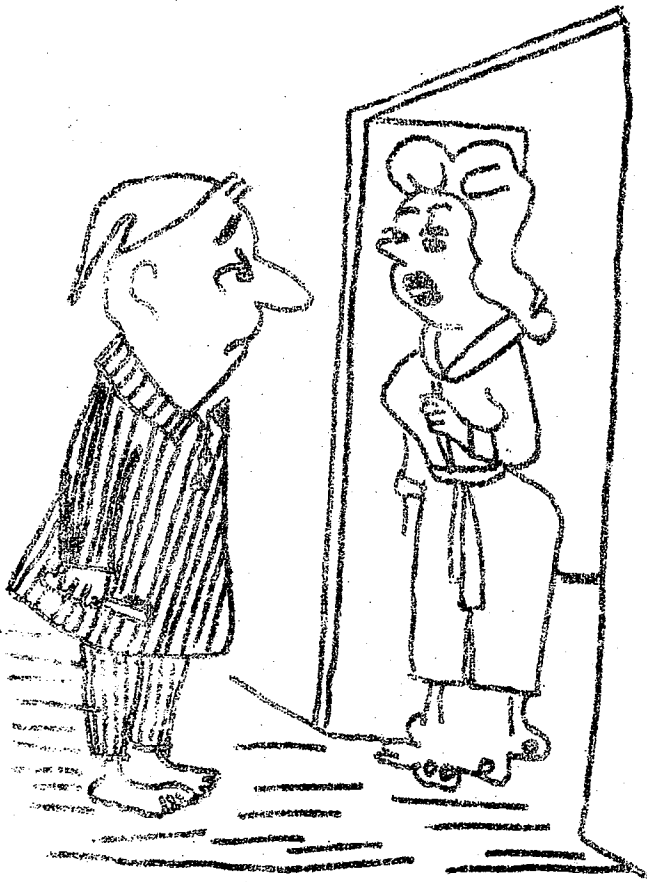
Social Events

The past foot ball season proved to be a very successful one for the energetic, football-minded boys who brought three consecutive victories to Elk Point High. Although only three games were played, our boys seemed well prepared and, as a result, were able to prance off the gridiron, chins-up. Our first game was played at Tyrman on October 14, and was probably the most exciting of the season. We drew blood first by scoring a quick T.D. early in the first quarter and went on to win the game by a score of 4 to 6. The game proved to be rougher than usual and the excited spectators witnessed an entire sixty minutes of razzle-dazzle football. Despite the roughness of the game the only injuring was the Tyrman's speedy captain who was the victim of a crashing tackle by Willie Malanuk, our alert lineman.

Our second game was played in Elk Point on October 27 when we hosted the Ashmont club. This game, a scoreless tie until the dying minutes of the final quarter, was also interesting and exciting. With only 4 minutes left in the game, the Elk Point boys struck hard and passed with one converted and one unconverted touchdown and marched off the field with a 13 to 0 victory. During this game both clubs moved the ball equally well in the air, but the Ashmont boys were slightly outdone on the ground plays. The turning point in this game was when Ashmont fumbled the ball deep in home territory and one of our alert linemen made a key recovery that set up our first T.D.

The third and final game of the season was played at Ashmont on November 4 and proved very successful for the Elk Point Club. This was one of the games in which all our players seemed completely at ease and played one of our best games. We undoubtedly outplayed Ashmont in all phases of the game, and strutted off the field with a 21 to 0 victory. Despite their two losses to us in the coming years. A sideline highlight of this game was the loss of a tire to one of the cars which was transporting the Elk Point squad to Ashmont. This comical incident occurred just on the outskirts of St. Paul and drew a smile from passing motorists.

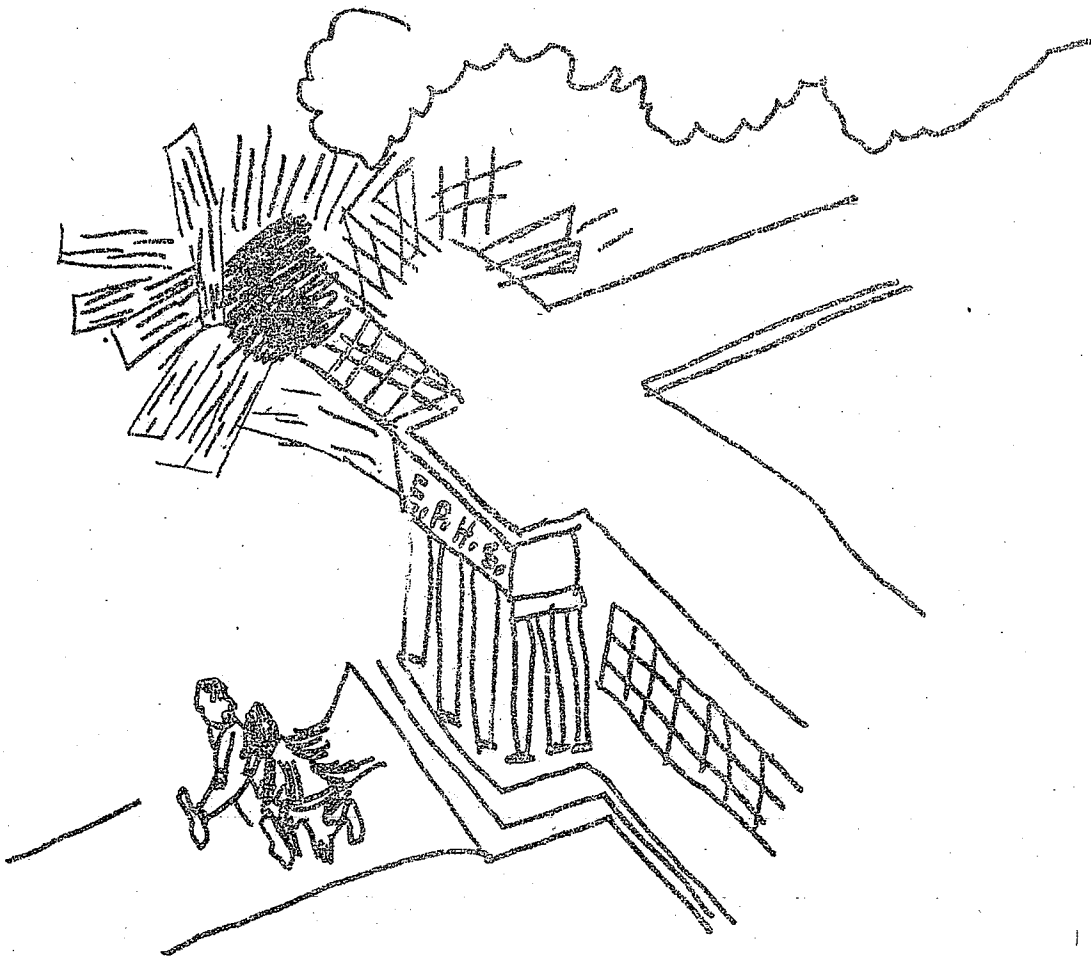

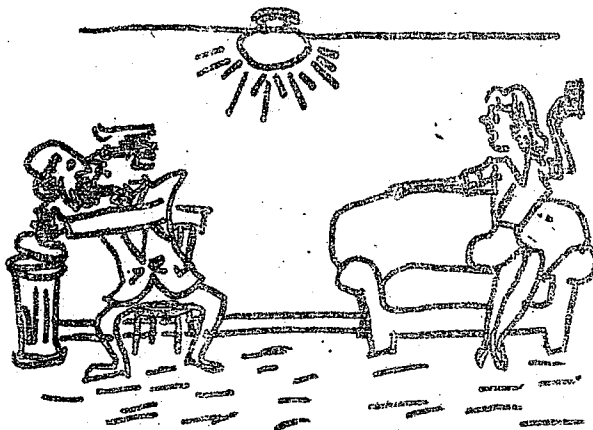

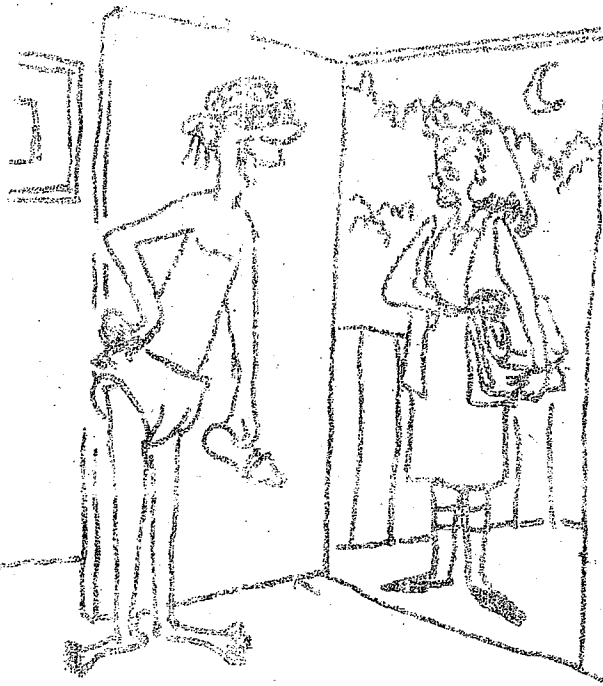

The boy in front and the girl behind him, apparently had a misunderstanding. Is red hair more attractive? "Kneel and Knight?"

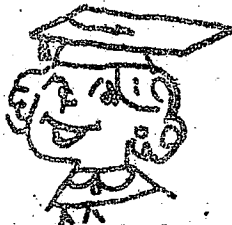

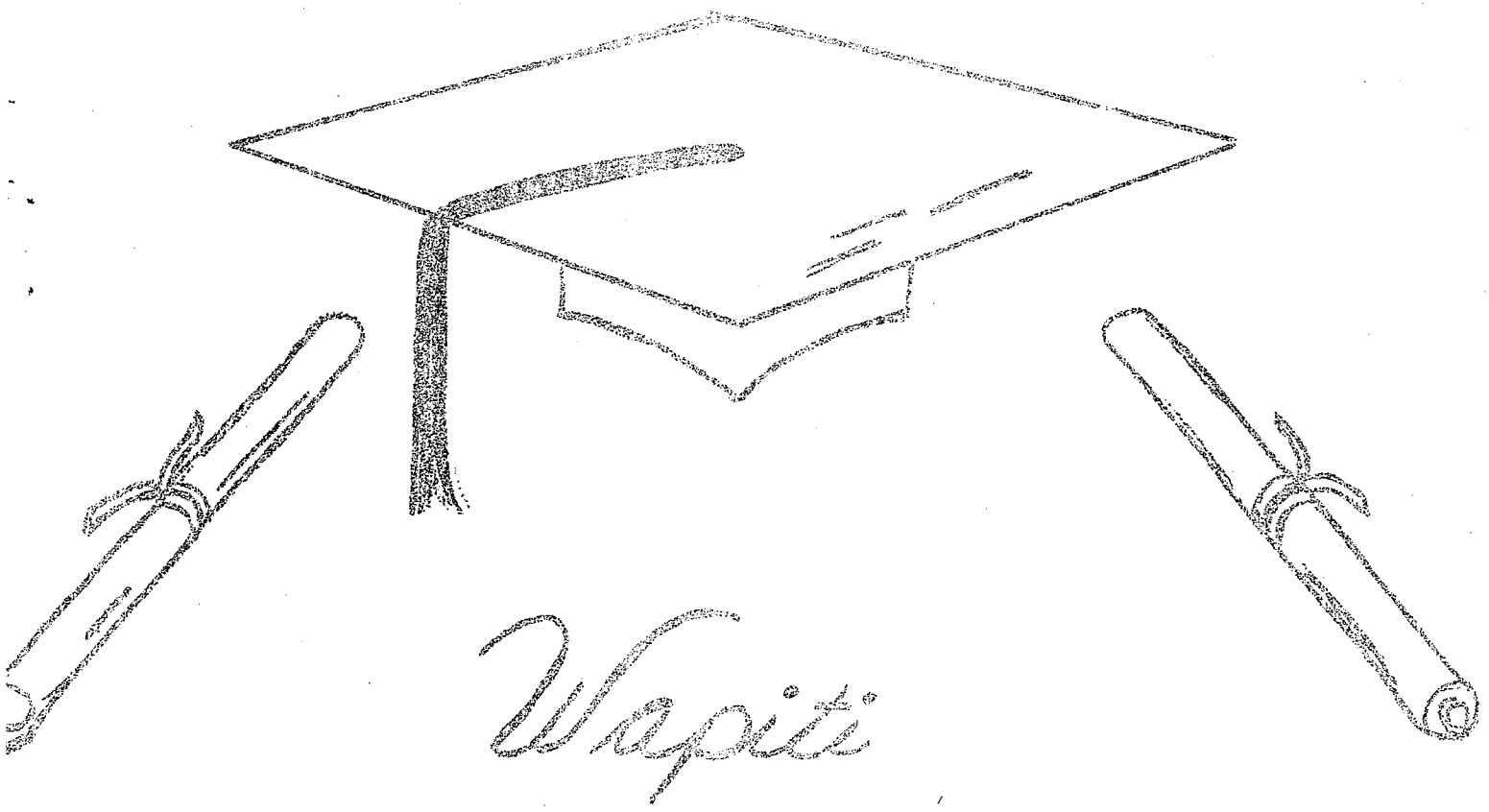


