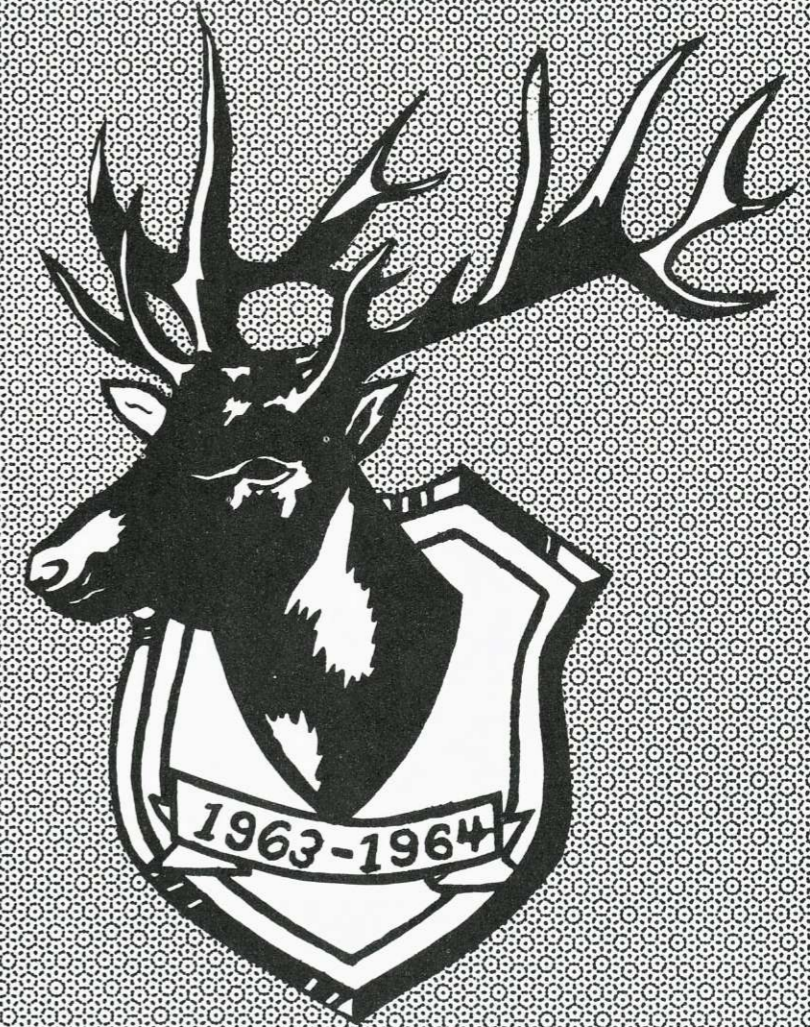

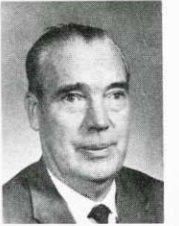
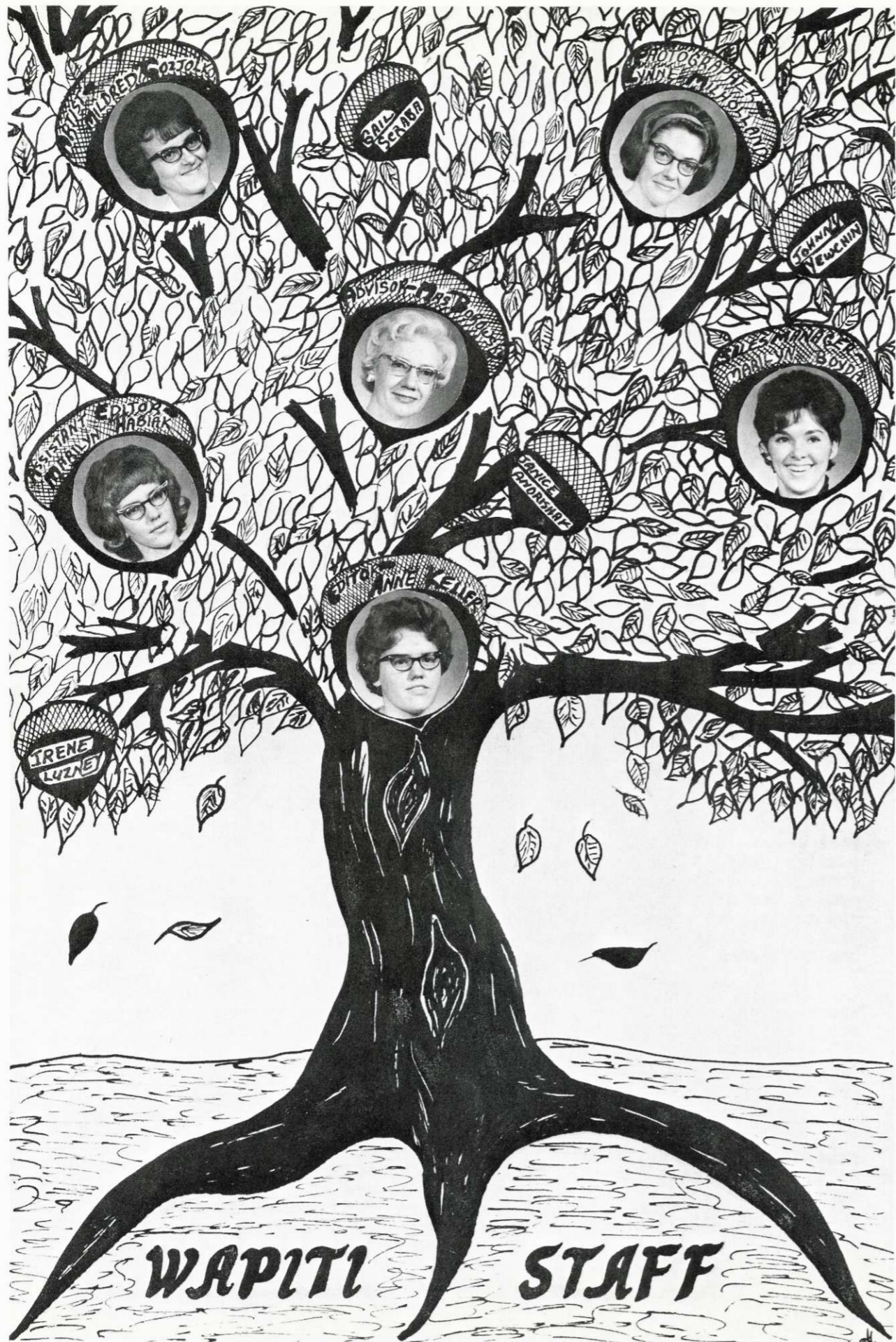
EDITORIAL

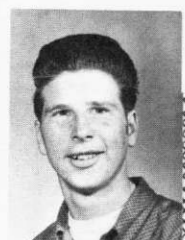
AARBO, RAYMOND- Raymond has decided on a career as a Medical Laboratory Technician. He plans to attend the University of Alberta in Edmonton.

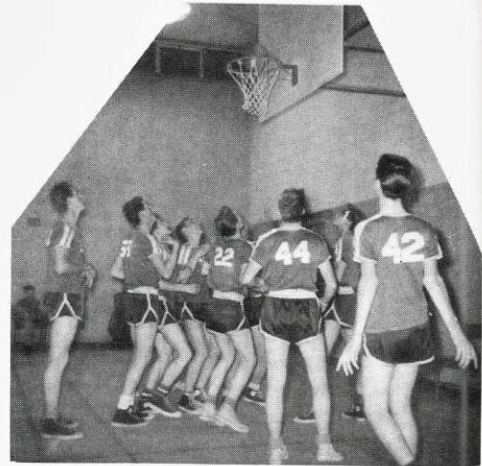
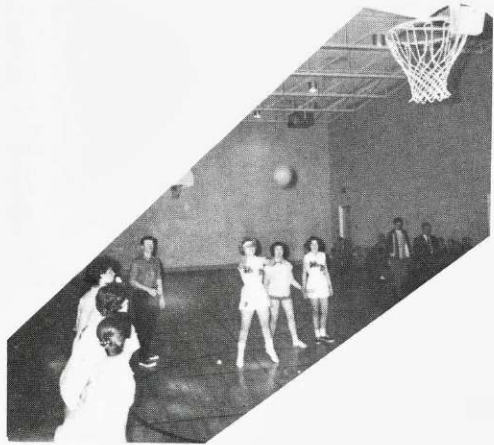
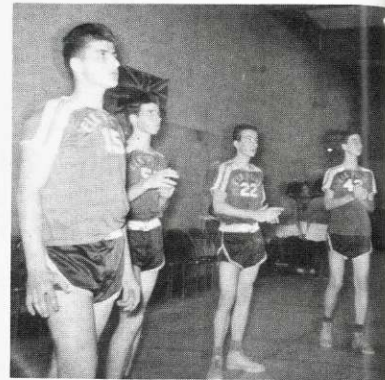
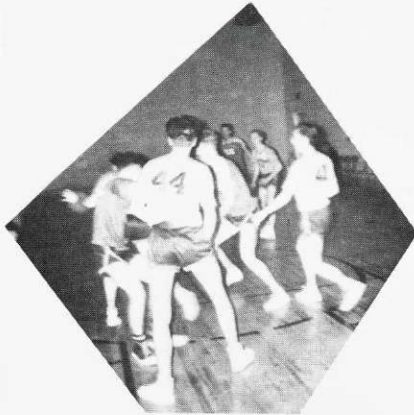
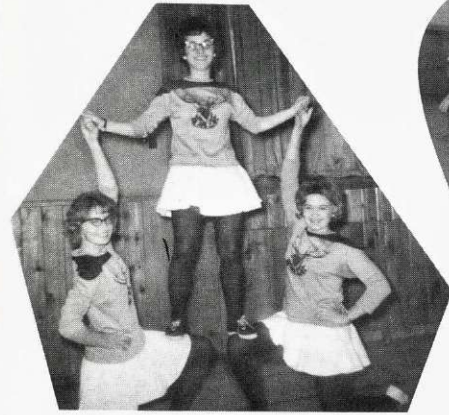
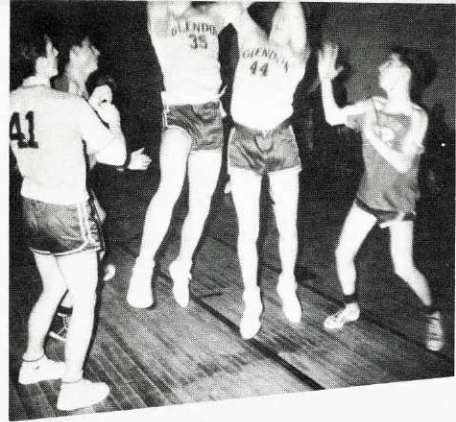
But we must not be nostalgic, for today marks not only the close of our high school years, but also the opening of a whole new life before us.

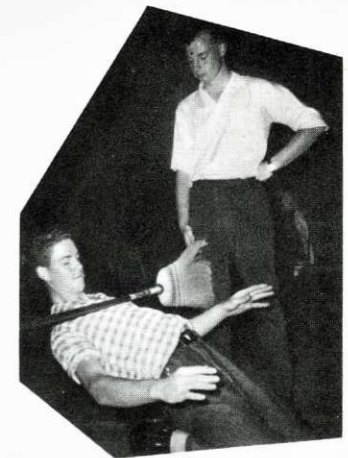
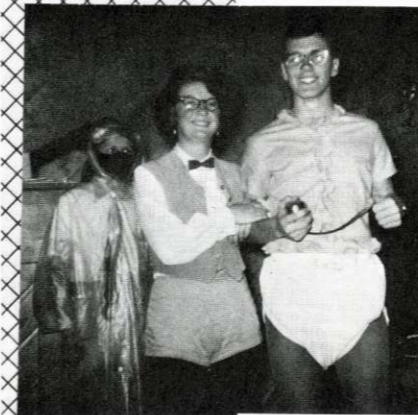


AMATEUR NIGHT

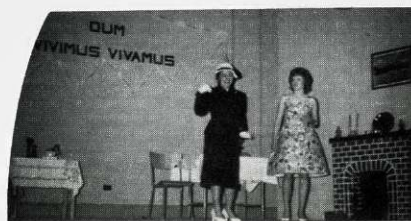

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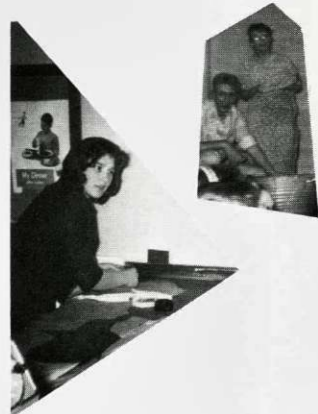
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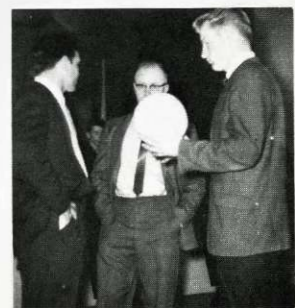
