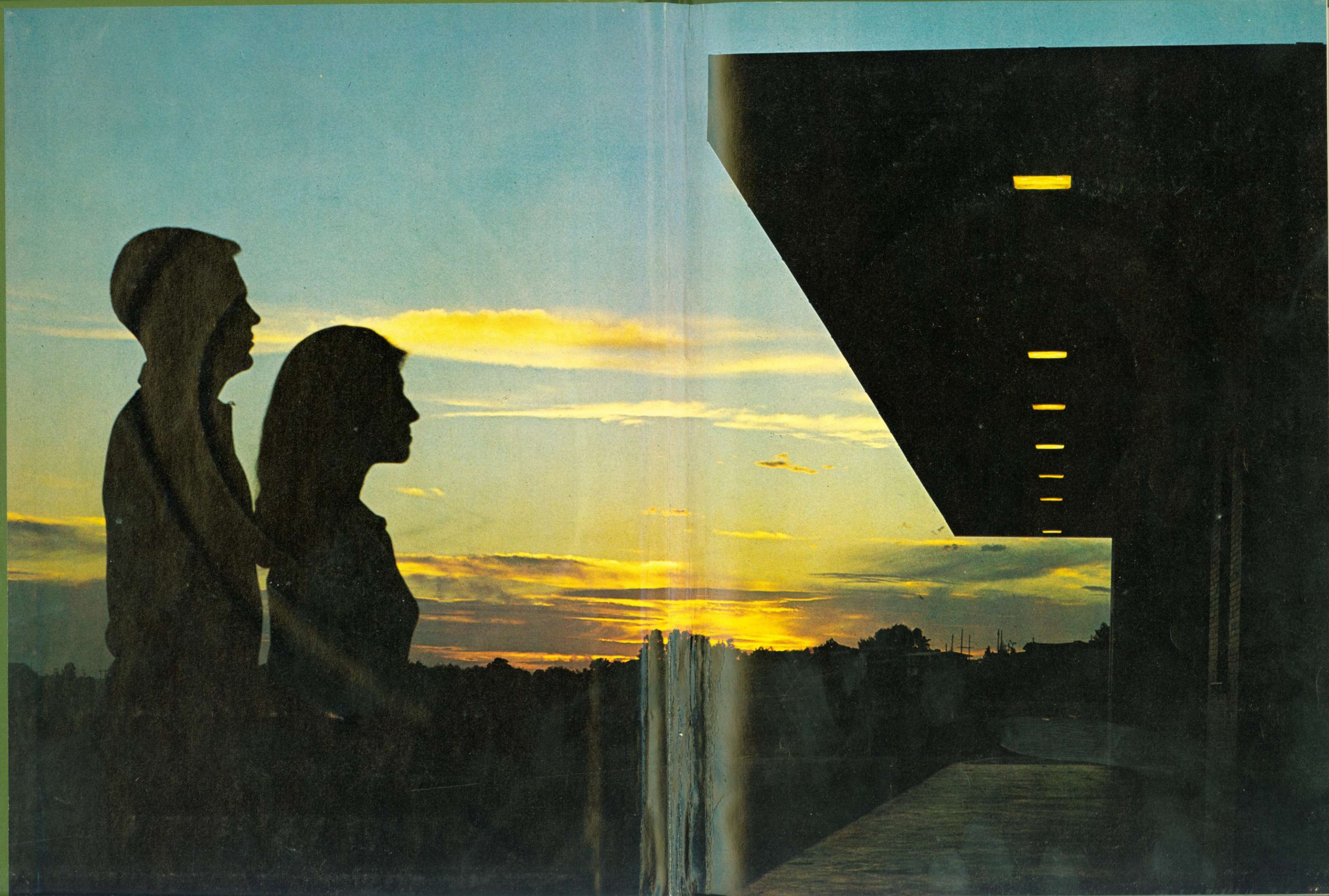

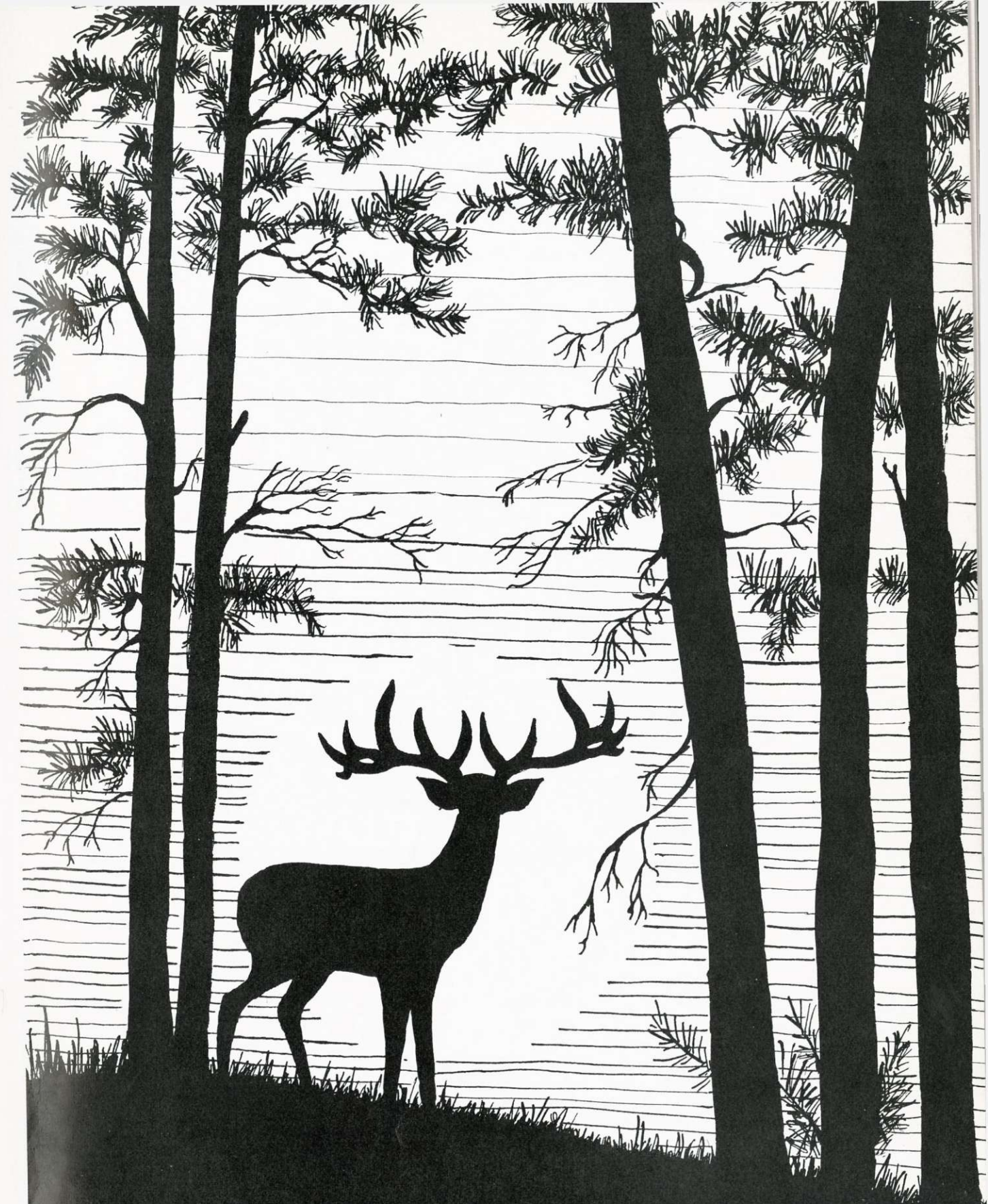
Getting out this publication is no picnic!

DEDICATION

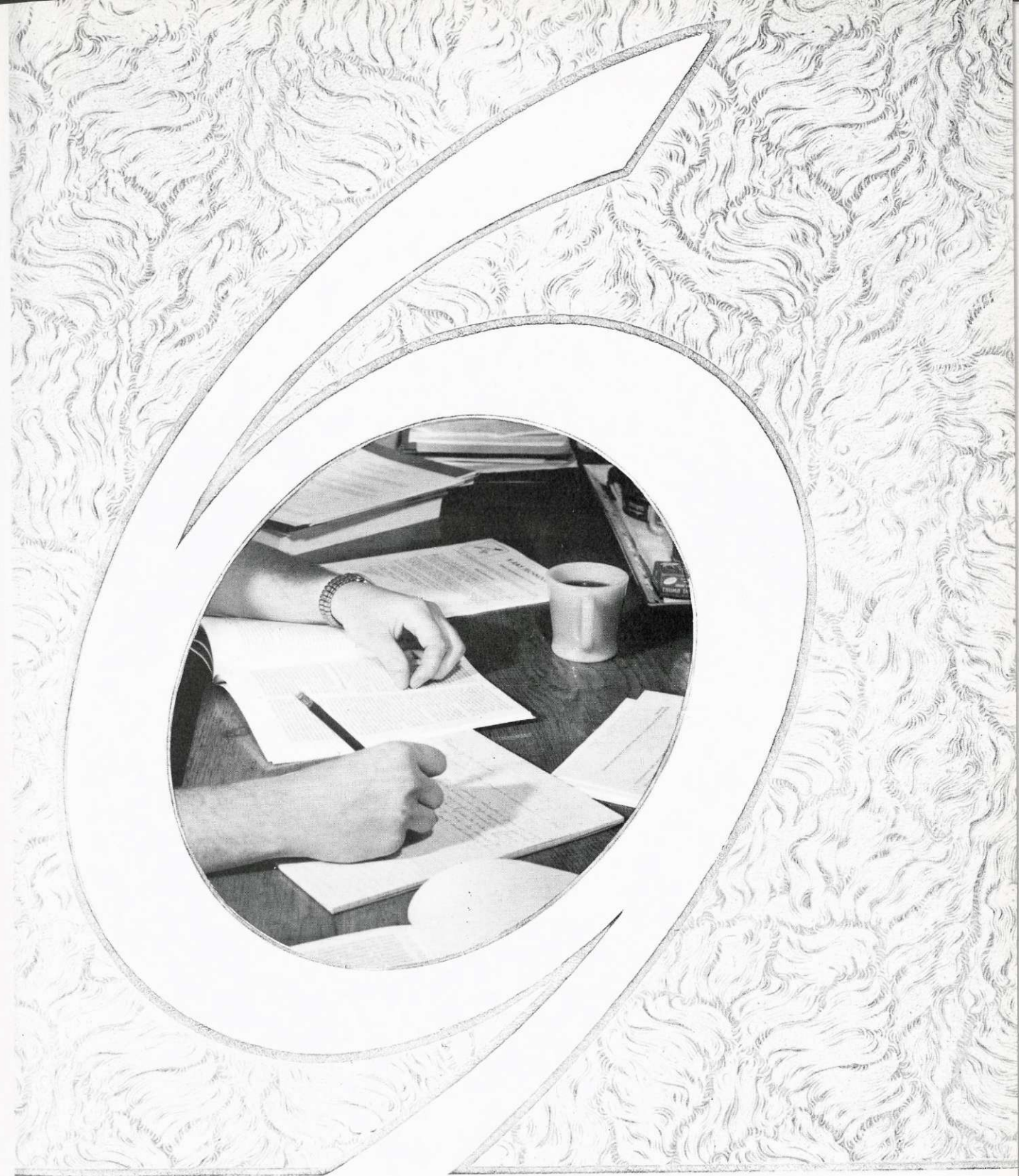

VALEDICTORIAN ADDRESS



Today we stand before you after twelve years and for some thirteen years of formal education. Twelve years is undoubtedly a long time but that period has passed rather quickly. I know that all of us participating in this ceremony have mixed feelings of emotions towards those years. It hasn't been exactly milk and honey and at times things were very trying for us, but we have survived. This formality today is in recognition of our having accomplished that much at least.

But today is not the end of our education. Many of us shall proceed to post-secondary institutes of education in hopes of making this a better world to live in, for mankind surely does have its problems.

Ours is an era of advancing technology but unfortunately also one of continuing human injustices where success and happiness are often confused with a little green god called money. Now men are rarely judged by their actions but rather by the creases in their pants, their white shirts and ties, their haircuts or their lack of haircuts and their general clean-cut look.

The most gross of human injustices we practice is that of racial discrimination. We condemn a man without knowing anything about him. What has happened to the belief in the essential goodness of man, or to the golden rule? Does one's white skin give him the God-given right to damn a man? What causes one to be so bigoted and so full of hatred? I find it not difficult to understand why so many men in so many places are agitating for reform, for we are dearly in need of some reforms.

The question then is what can the graduands do about these inequities? We can't just say, "Well look, that's his problem." The answer I think very possibly lies in education. I believe it to be a pompous unenlightened fool who condemns others before checking himself. I furthermore believe that the primary purpose of education is to teach us HOW to live and co-operate with our fellow man, in other words, brotherly love. Then and only then can we have the courage to attempt to change the things that need changing and the strength to accept those we can not. To me, that is education.

However, a very integral part of education is teaching us so we CAN live. By this I refer to schools of technology, universities, or any other institutes of learning in which we receive training. Some of this should be a result of a desire for self-improvement, and some from man's natural curiosity. We should also be educated so that we might enjoy to the fullest the many hours of leisure that we have.

One last but extremely important thing; our formal education should instill in us a deep desire to participate in our democratic process, for we are the very roots of democracy. The degree of success of this system is reflected in the extent of participation by its members and we are the keys to that success.

Ours is the future. In a few years we shall bear the brunt of the blow. What we make of that future depends on our individual goals, our hopes and aspirations, our sense of moral obligation and our ambition. But words are too cheap. It is our ACTIONS that do and will count. Those are the words that I would ask graduands, parents, guests, fellow students, teachers - everyone to remember.

SPORTS REVIEW 1968-69

The athletes of the F. G. Miller High School have almost completed another season in the sports field, where they had their victories and their defeats. Each athlete has completed to the best of his or her ability, individually, or as a team. Team spirit and determination has helped athletes to come from behind and still emerge as victors. For the first time this year, our school had representatives in the Zone cross-country running held at Vermilion. Success there sent Linda Rylance, Judy Tredger, Carol Zarowny and Jim Tredger to the Provincial finals held at Red Deer where they made a good showing, but did not reach the top.

Cross-country running was followed by volleyball. At the tournament in St. Paul, Elk Point made it to the finals. The senior girls lost the County Cup to the powerful Vilna squad; while the boys, as in other years, lost their match to their old rivals - the invincible Glendon battalion.

Then came the schools most successful and best supported game - basketball. The senior girls, winning nine out of their twelve league games, lost the County Cup, which they had previously held for a number of years, to Mallaig. The Senior boys, after having won nine out of their twelve league games, lost the Cup to the tall and mighty Ashmont Falcons. Later on in the year, the Junior High basketball tournament was held in Elk Point where the Junior High boys displaying a magnificent quality of basketball won over Glendon to earn the County Cup for the first time. The Junior High girls lost in the final game to Racette.

The High School hockey team, without a coach, and with little practice managed to win their only encounter by a narrow margin to a six-man Vilna team.

Student and staff co-operation has made curling an outstanding sport where individuals won trophies in different events. The Senior High girls' curling team travelled to Edmonton to participate in the North Eastern Alberta School-Girls' Play-offs. They were not successful, however.

Next came the District Badminton Tournament, held for a second year in Elk Point. The Tournament showed that our players were very successful, in that six out of twelve players proceeded to the Zone play-offs in Vegreville. Those representing our school and their division were: Valerie Modin and Helen Kalynchuk (girls' singles event) Isabel Dumont and Linda Rylance (girls' doubles) Jim Tredger and Reggie Ewoniak (boys' singles event).

Intramural sports have been continually carried on from one sport to another throughout the school term. Teachers and students showed enthusiasm for such sports as flag-football, volleyball, basketball, basketball-golf and floor hockey, carried on at noon hour.

A softball and baseball tournament was held in Elk Point on May 24 with Glendon. Our Junior High and Senior High girls' teams won both their games; two straight. The Junior High boys' softball and Senior High boys' hardball teams won their first games and lost their second games. These matches are undecided as yet and another game will be played later. Junior High boys' hardball and Senior boys' softball teams won automatically since Glendon did not field a team in these events. The winners in all six divisions will be participating in the County Tournament to be held in Elk Point on June 7.

Another successful sports year is drawing to a close, and it has been a great pleasure and honour to be your Sports' Director for the 1968-69 year. I would like to express my thanks to both students and teachers for their co-operation and support in the field of sports this year.

DEDICATION OF OUR LIBRARY

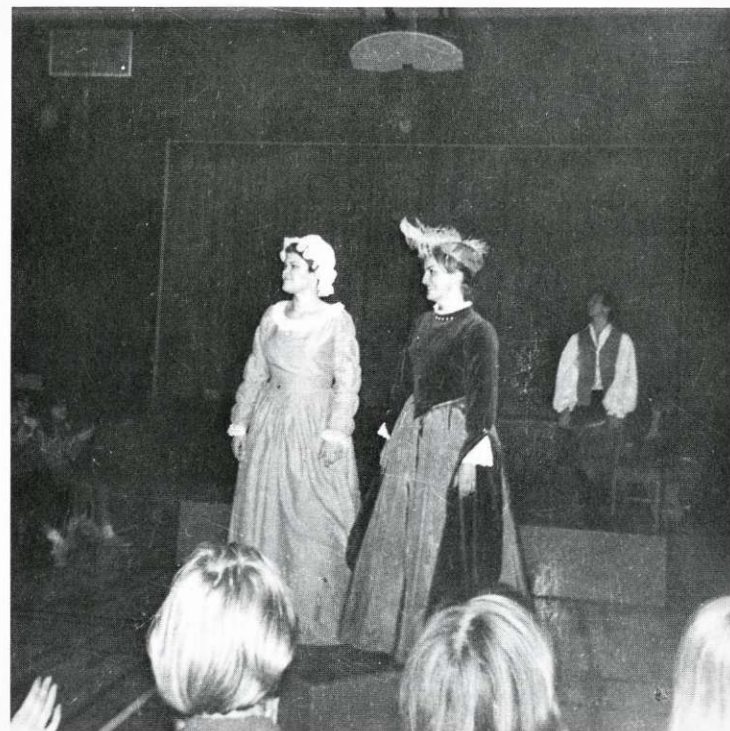

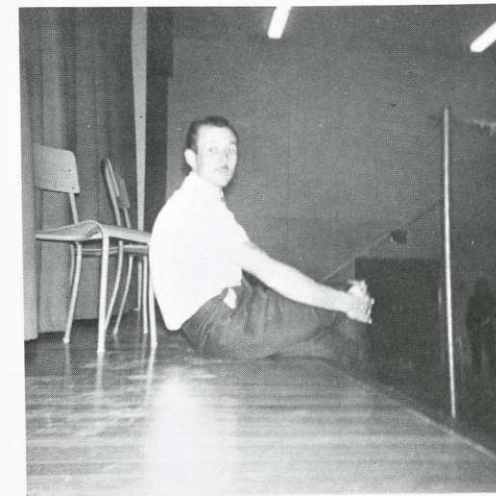
ALLIED ARTS COMPANY
