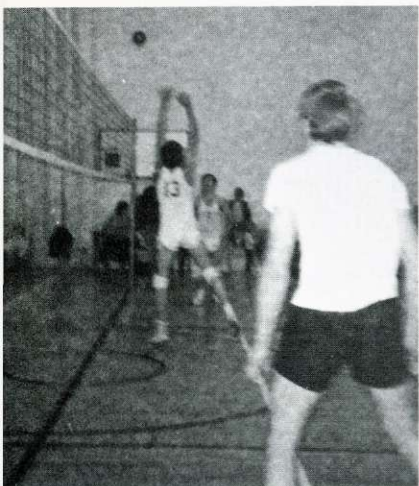
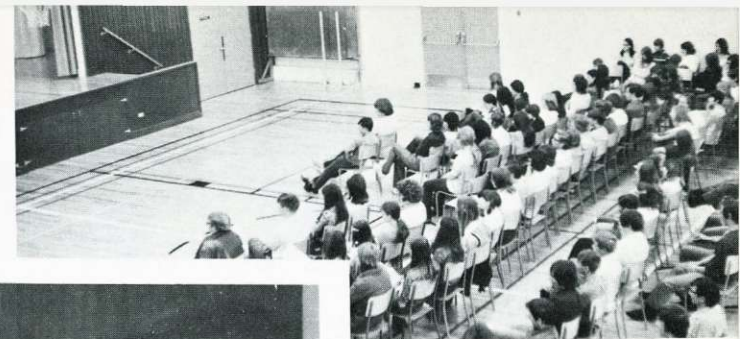
SEPTEMBER

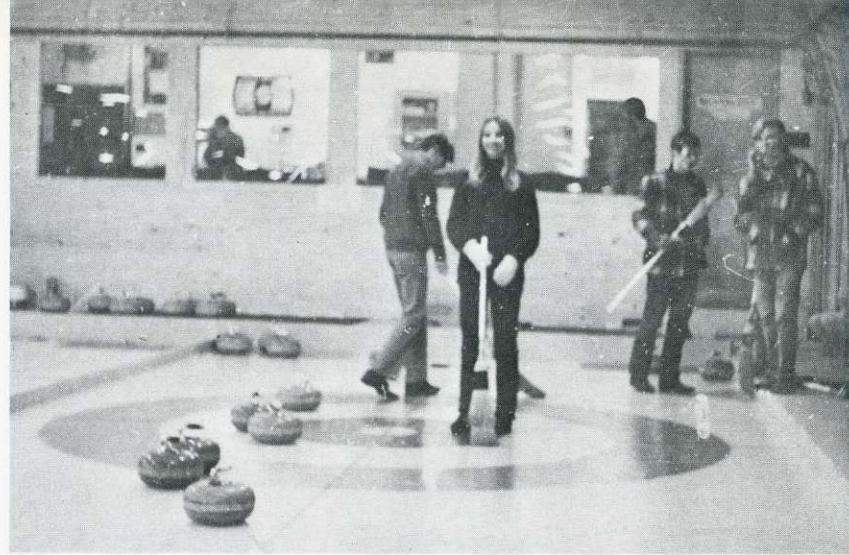

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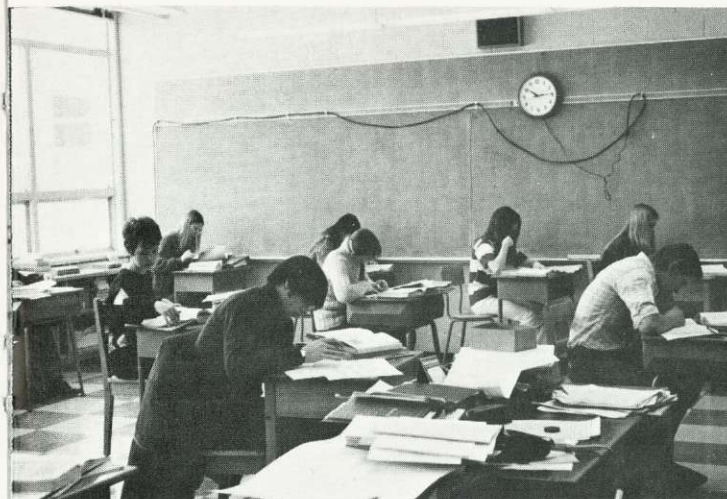
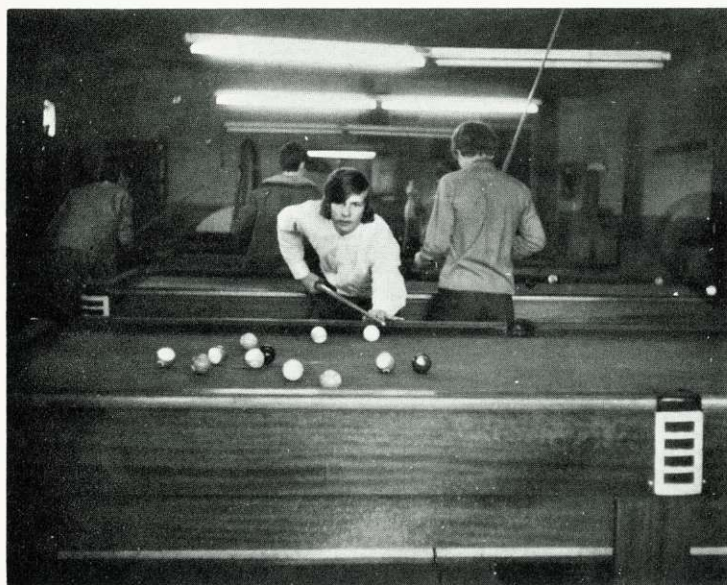


JANUARY

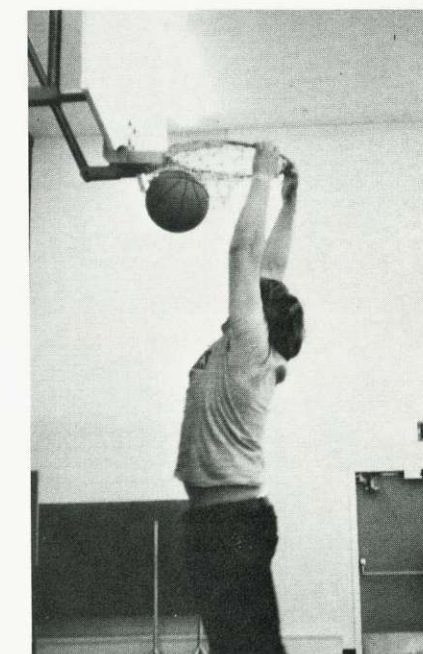

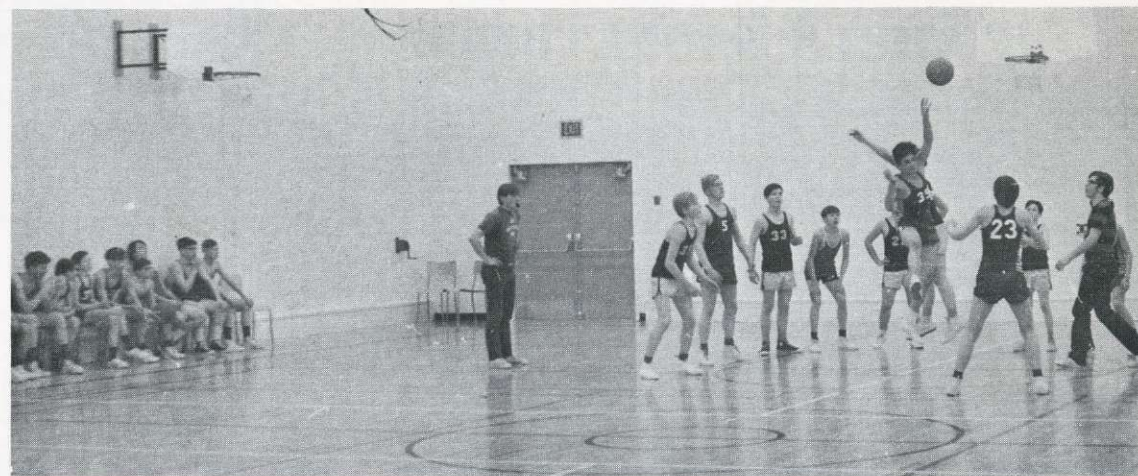
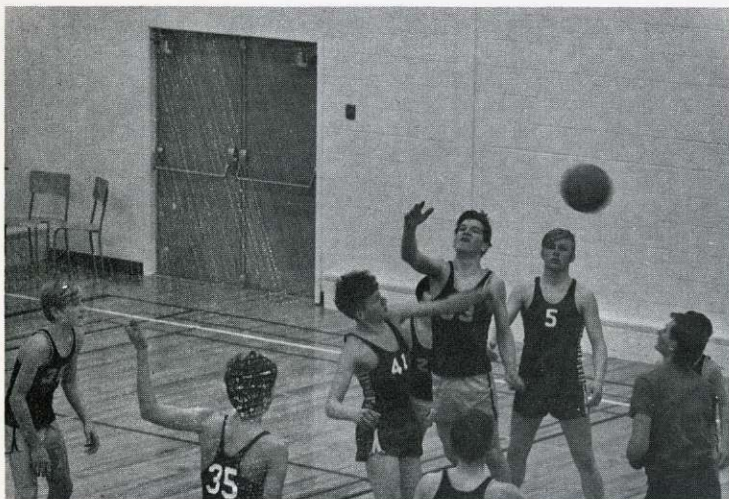




FEBRUARY

A Teen Dance was held in the Elk's Hall on February 27th, with BIG DIPPER GREEN playing.

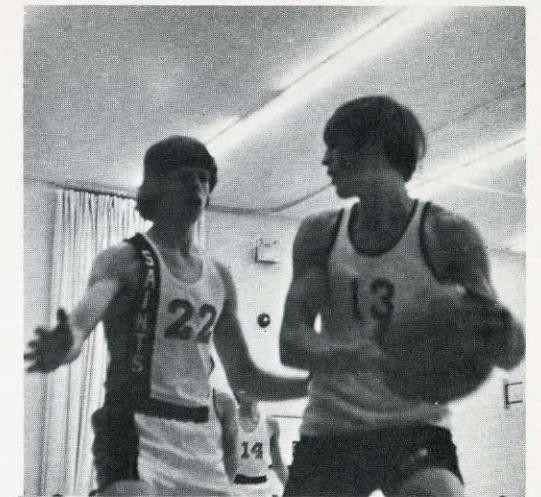

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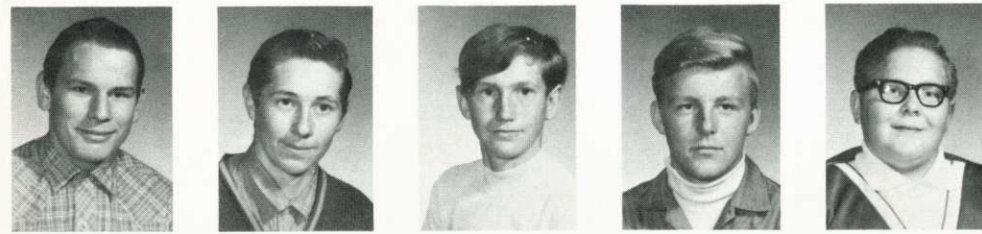
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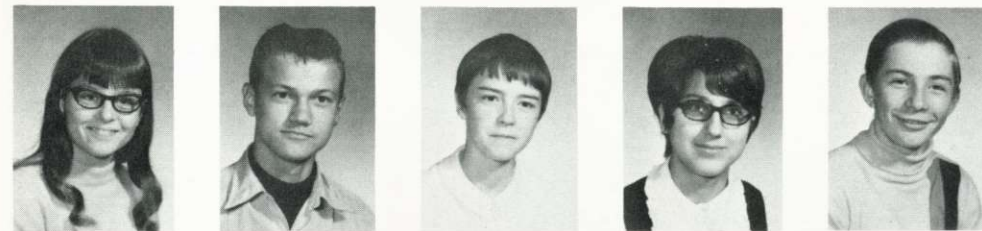
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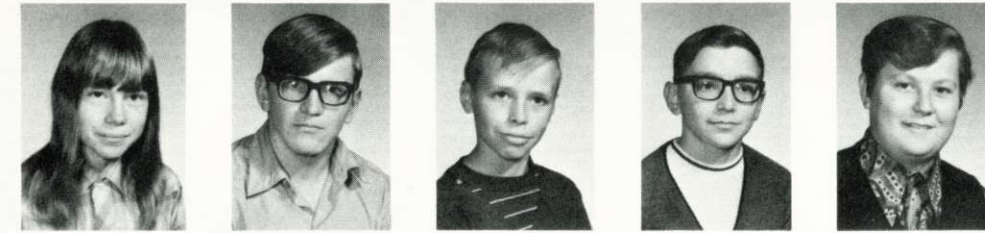


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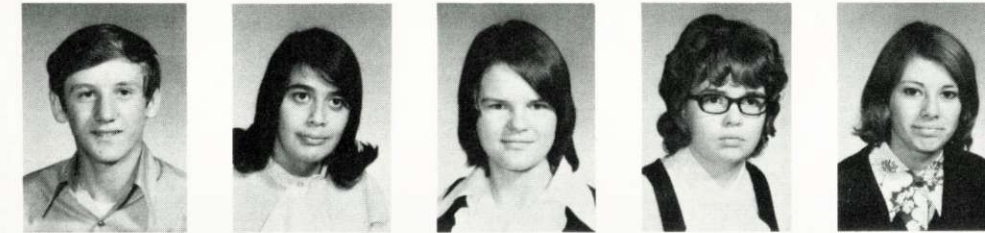


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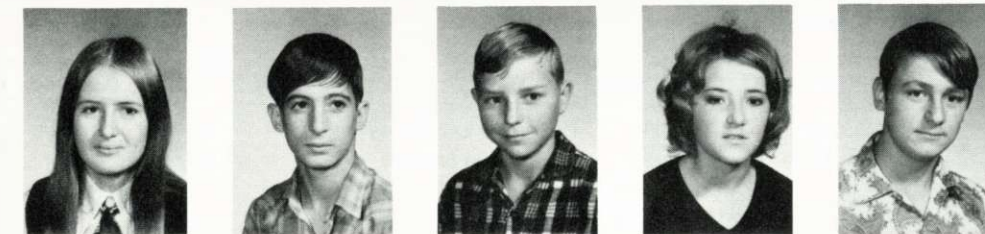
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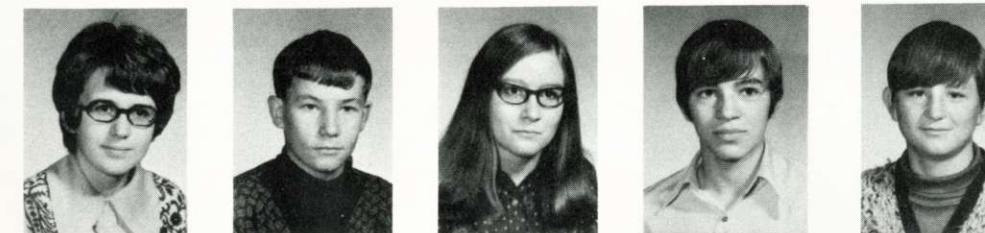
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Editorial

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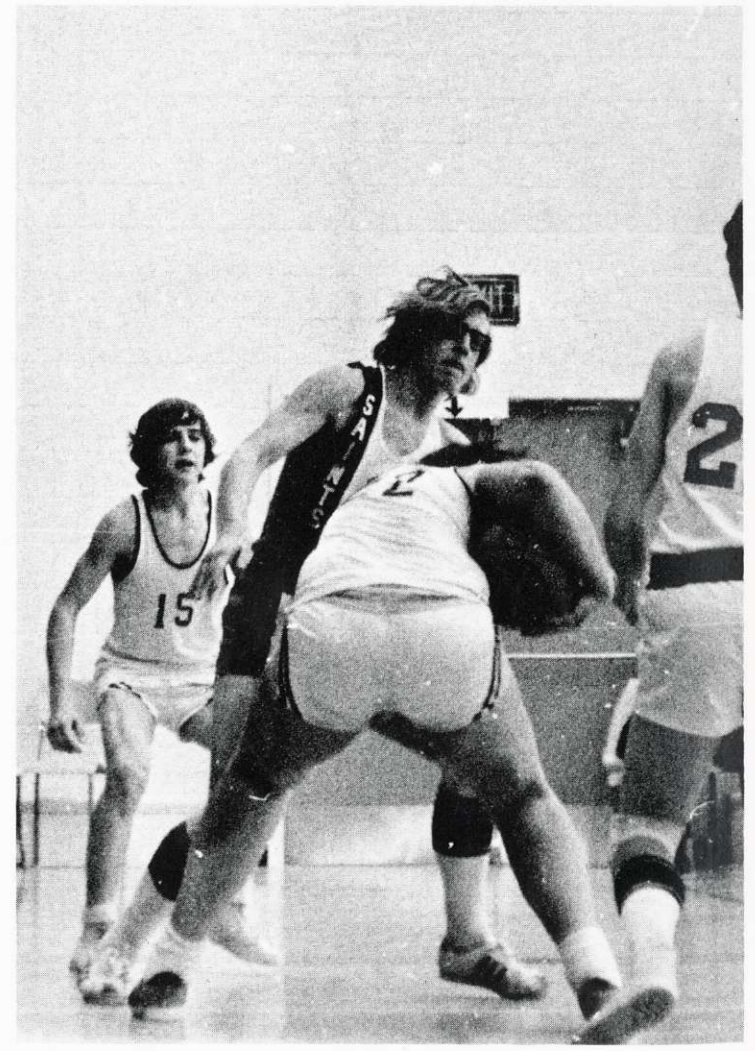
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
