# DEDICATION



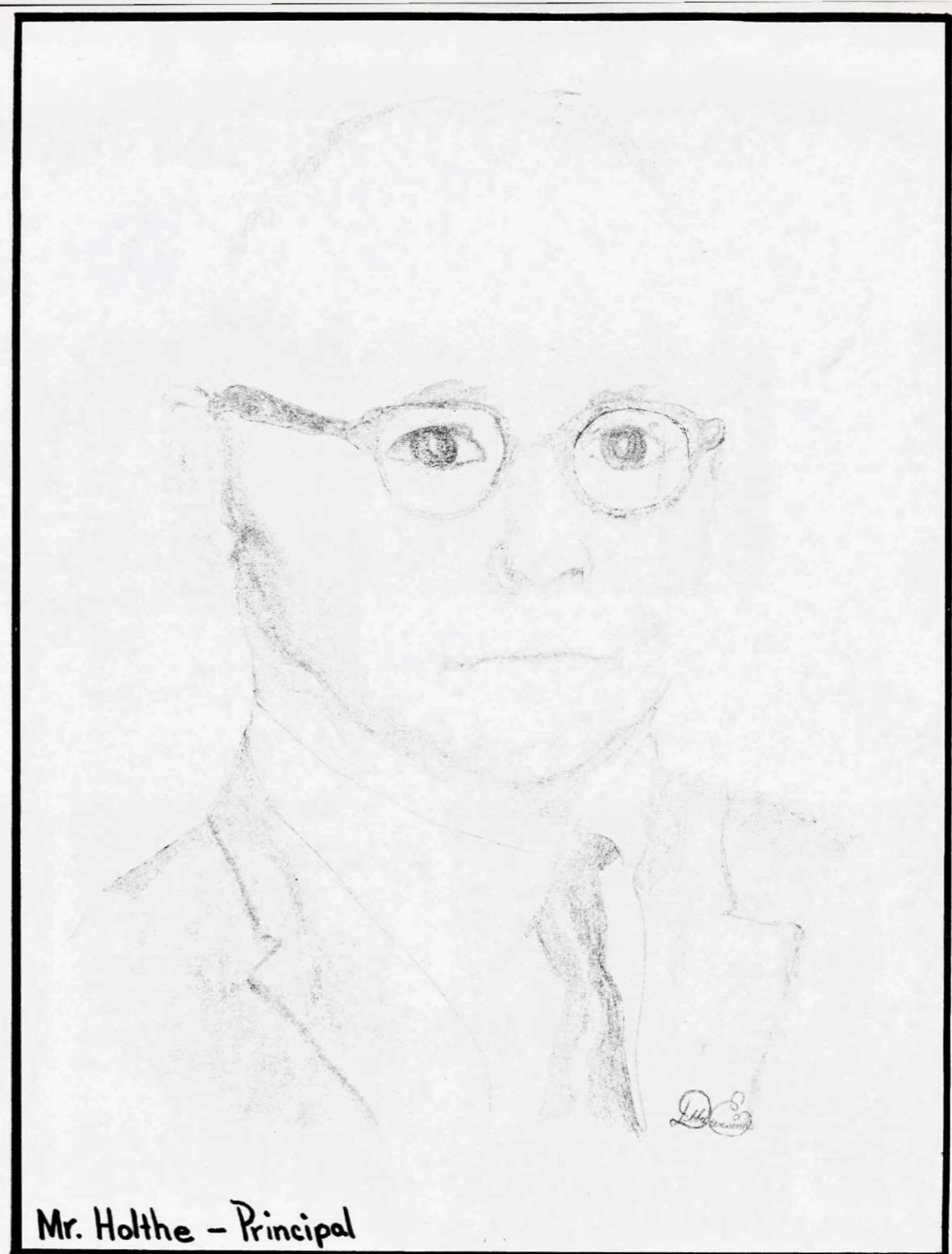
